LHA is an organisation which champions the mainstream adoption of livable housing design standards in new homes, making them more comfortable, safer and easier to access for everybody, every day, at all stages of life.

A `Livable' home is a mark of quality. The LHA Design standards makes easy everyday living. Easier to:

- Invite friends and family to visit with step-free entry and access from street.
- Welcome guest or getting the shopping in the front doors, with a generous entry
- Manoeuvre a pram, sporting equipment or furniture with wider corridors
- Bathe the kids or relax in a more generous bathroom
- Stay at home due to a temporary injury, disability or life stage.

WHAT ARE THE CORE DESIGN ELEMENTS FOR SILVER LHA?

The seven core Silver LHA design feature elements are:

- 1. A safe, continuous and step-free path of travel from the street entrance and/or parking area to a dwelling entrance that is level.
- 2. At least one, level (step-free) entrance into the dwelling.
- 3. Wide internal doors and corridors that facilitate comfortable and unimpeded movement between spaces.
- 4. A toilet on the ground (or entry) level that provides easy access.
- 5. A bathroom that contains a hobless (step-free) shower recess.
- 6. Reinforced walls around the toilet, shower and bath to support the safe installation of grabrails at a later date.
- 7. A continuous handrail on one side of any stairway where there is a rise of more than one metre.
